Reason 3

I don't know where they are at present.

He does have other relatives in the City, I think he has a sister - she attended the funeral, I'm afraid I don't know her address.

Up to the time of his death he was employed as a Market Porter in St. Martin's Market, City. His employer was in fact the City of Birmingham (Markets Dept.) He had been employed there for about four and a half years.

Up to this present employment he was on Social Security because he was made redundant from **Reason 2** He worked there on nights, he was there for a number of years, he was there in fact before I knew him.

I do know James Frederick CADDICK had three sisters and one brothers. Their first names were Rosie, Rita and I'm afraid I don't know the others. It wasn't until the funeral as I have told you previously that I had ever seen them before. I do know that his mother and father are deceased.

I cannot produce James' birth certificate because he had lost it and was going to obtain a duplicate. I do know he was 56 years of age, born in Birmingham on the 6th August, 1918.

I last saw James alive at 6.00 p.m. on the evening of Thursday, 21st November, 1974. He told me he was going to the 'Mulberry Bush' l.h. and would be back early around about quarter-to-ten. He went on his own although he used to meet friends inside the pub.

On Thursday, 23rd November, 1974, I attended the Coroner Court in Newton Street. ~~I did not want to identify James' body and as far as far as I knew no person has seen it.~~

I was given some of James' belongings back the same day, such as keys, a medical card and some prescriptions. I can positively identify
